Location of the school:


The school is situated in a quiet residential area, in close proximity to two main roads - see 'roads' pg 3.

Trains/Tube:

The school is an 8-10 minute walk from Surbiton station, which provides a frequent express service to London Waterloo station.

Roads:

The main route to central London or Guildford is along the A3 which passes through the lower half of the borough, south of Surbiton and Kingston. Two main exits from the A3 (Tolworth Rise and the Hook roundabout), serve the main routes into Surbiton and Kingston.

These routes pass either side of the school, both within a one minute walk of the school site.

Despite the proximity of such major roads, the school is situated on a relatively quiet road. However this is often used as a cut through for local traffic and has now been designated a 20mph limit.

Catchment area:

The school has a wide catchment area with pupils coming from addresses across the parish. The majority of pupils come from KT6 and KT5 postcodes (Surbiton and Berrylands), with others coming from KT8 (Chessington), KT1 (Kingston) and KT3 (New Malden)

Historically the school has a high percentage of pupils from Chessington (on the far side of the A3) because the school had space available to offer to children from other wards. This is no longer the case but as siblings still remain at the school the percentage of pupils from Chessington is slightly higher than might be expected.

SEN Pupils:

At present we have no pupils with physical disabilities requiring wheelchair usage. We do have a dedicated parking space in the staff car park for use by disabled pupils.

Other information about the pupils who attend our school:

There is a refuge centre for mothers in abusive relationships situated close to the school. Children of the mothers staying at the centre are welcomed into the school. We often find that when the families are rehoused the parents are still willing to travel to keep the children at St. Matthew's.

The majority of staff live locally – particularly teaching assistants who are ex-parents. Other members of staff travel from further afield including TW12, SE23, KT8, KT2, KT12 which are not covered by our current pupils.

We are a Healthy School. Accreditation achieved in Feb 2009. We have a member of staff responsible for ensuring that we maintain out Healthy Schools status.

National Fitness Day

On Wednesday 27th September we got active with National Fitness Day! Every class spent some time doing a fitness activity ranging from dancing in the classroom to running in the field. The children all had a great time and left feeling very fit!

We provide a fruit snack at playtimes for those that wish to have it. Reception Class children have the option of having a drink of milk at playtimes.

Healthy activities are promoted through our PE curriculum and we employ a number of outside agencies (e.g. DDMix) to provide the children with specialist teaching in this area. The importance of exercise to promote good health is part of this.



At lunch times we have specialist sports coaches to organise sports activities for KS2 provided by Pleilades.

Our school teams are very active, taking part in a variety of sporting events. Where possible the children will walk to the event. If the event is too far away we encourage car sharing by parents to transport their own child and others.

What environment projects are run at the school?

We have forest school lessons for all age groups running through out the year to encourage children to make the most of the outdoors and to learn to respect their surroundings and understand the importance of caring for the environment.

Our Year 6 pupils attend a residential at Hindleap Warren and part of their course is to learn more about their natural environment and how to care for it.

We have pupils in class who are in charge of delivering recycling to a central location for collection. We have a pond which was put in place in Autumn 2017 to encourage the children to explore this habitat and learn about the wild life which lives there.

In line with building regulations our heating system is of the latest eco standards.

Does the school have a School Trip policy?

We have a policy relating to educational visits. Where possible classes are encouraged to consider using sustainable travel methods when planning school journey. Our proformas include considerations when travelling by foot and public transport. Staff record their school trips on the EVOLVE system so we can ensure that health and safety when using roads and transport are always comnisdered as part of the risk assessment.

Recent travel surveys suggest that over 20% of the children cycle and scoot to school. (These have been summer time surveys so, assuming that fewer children cycle and scoot in the winter, we have ample storage at present.)

Does the school promote to staff, pupils and visitors on how to get to school by public transport? Does the school prospectus discourage car use for the school run?

Items included in the school prospectus:

Location of the school

The school is located between the Upper Brighton Road (A243) and the Ewell Road (A240). The children's entrance is located on Kingsdowne Road (which is open only at the start and the end of the school day). However, the school office is located in Langley Road.

St. Matthew's Primary is in easy walking distance of several bus routes (71, K1, 281) and we actively promote the use of public transport and walking to school

We are committed to educate the children on environmental issues, and to promote the effects of healthy living linked to travelling to school. We encourage walking, cycling and the use of public transport, thereby reducing the number of cars coming to school. As part of our School Travel Plan, children are regularly provided with Road Safety training and Bikeability courses in upper KS2.

Has the school been involved in a Safer Routes to School project? If so what engineering measures were put in place?

In April 2010 the Travel Plan co-ordinator, a parent and two JTAs met with the Borough engineer and member of the sustainability team. We walked around the local area to look for ways in which the area could be made safer.

On the part of the school it was felt that signage was needed in Kingsdowne Road to make drivers aware of the exact location of the school. This has been put in place.

We discussed the provision of a 20mph limit and addition of traffic calming measures in Langley Road. This has been put in place.

We discussed the difficulties met by pupils along Kingsdowne Road and at the junctions with Ewell Road and Ditton Road. This has been followed up since by one of the JTAs writing to a council member to gather more support. This has been unsuccessful at present.

<u>Curriculum – what does the school currently do to teach road safety or environmental education? Do pupils have any lessons which have a transport theme?</u>

Jan 2016 – Jul 2016 – Road safety club formed for Year 2 pupils – successfully run with 4 pupils per session and organised by JTAs

Jan 2017 – Jul 2017- Road Safety Club run by JTA's – increased to 6 pupils per session Jun / Jul 2017 – Activities are provided for teachers for use with children taking bikeability Spring 2017 – Year 6 take part in the Junior citizens scheme which covers aspects of personal and road safety.

Year 1 look at their local area including mapwork and field work.

Year 2 learn about Explorers so look at different forms of transport and inventors who invented various transportation. In Summer, Castles will look at various forms of travel too.

Year 3 currently learn about economic well-being and financial responsibility through the topic of let's go shopping. This could also include reference to sustainable travel to the shops and an introduction to the idea of food miles.

Year 4 study where our food comes from and learn about food miles. They also learn about Electricity in Science and examine aspects of electricity production including wind and water power.

Year 4 also study a Science unit on Electricity. This has included elements of sustainable power and the invention of a knee power device, using walking to power a device of their choice.

Year 5's Geography topic focusses on the America's with a particular emphasis on Brazil and the Amazon Basin. This is an ideal opportunity to discuss the impact of man on his environment and the ways that we can cut down our own impact.

Year 6 learn about the human body in terms of the circulatory system. Part of their work is to recognise the positive impact of exercise (e.g. walking and cycling) on the body.

Year 6 also attend the Junior Citizens event which supports the children in considering how to respond to real life situations including travel, transport and road safety.

Additional activities

We have 2 active JTAs. They were interviewed for their position by last year's JTAs. They had time to prepare to answer questions about what they understood about the role of the JTA, why they thought they would be a good JTA and what initiatives they would like to put in place. Mia and Lexi were the successful candidates.

School Travel

We had a very busy start to October in terms of travel training for the children. 40 children across Years 1 & 2 took part in an hour long scooter training session. They were taught about safety aspects such as wearing a helmet and being visible, how to ride their scooter safely, as well as how to keep themselves safe when scooting e.g to keep an eye open for cars coming out of driveways.

17 children from Year 6 took part in the Bikeability scheme and had a week long course learning about looking after their cycles to keep them in good condition, road safety and had on-road sessions to enable them to practice their cycling skills.

Our Junior Travel Ambassadors, Lexi and Mia, attended training about their role and have lots of ideas about how they can promote road safety and sustainable travel to our pupils. With Road Safety Week coming up in November they are busy preparing an assembly, activities for the children and a competition.

May we also take this opportunity to remind you that scooters and bikes should not be ridden within the school grounds. We have advised the children that they should not mount their bikes until they are out of the school gate so they do not obstruct the paths or others walking through the gates.

Display – JTAs have an ongoing Road Safety Display in the Computer suite



Assembly to promote Speed Down save lives campaign – JTAs spoke to the whole school and talked about '20 is plenty' and also the braking distances of cars travelling at different speeds. They adapted the Powerpoint and wrote their own script.



They introduced a poster competition on the theme of 'Speed Down' and in a later assembly they announced the winners.



Final assembly of the Autumn Term – Head reminded the children to be safe on the roads and keep well so that they return in the New Year in one piece.
